Dear members and friends

Communications from the Brisbane Catholic Historical Society have been as scarce as hen's teeth this year, and we apologise sincerely for this. The Society has undergone a difficult transition to new management. Fr Chris Hanlon, our dedicated President for over two decades, retired from his position, and it took some time to fill his shoes. At the Society's Annual General Meeting on 22 February, no nominations were received, and so—after heroic work by then-Secretary Luke Preston—an Extraordinary General Meeting was held by Zoom on 26 March. At this meeting, a slate of office-bearers (informally agreed after the AGM) was declared elected. The new Committee has since been working to develop a program of speakers for the latter half of this year, and we can now announce below our first two events for this year. The Committee has also resolved to experiment with different times and venues for our presentations, to suit particular topics and in the hope of greater participation.

A second reason for the absence of communications since the election of the new committee has been a problem with our email system, arising from system changes made by Google. We had hoped to resolve these quickly and get a newsletter out to you, but the resolution is taking longer than expected. Hence we have temporarily reverted to the gmail address previously used by our secretary Sister Anne Hetherington, and this newsletter is coming to you from secretarybchs@gmail com (rather than from

New Committee

The new committee of the Society, as elected on 26 March, is as follows:

President: Michael Halliday. Michael is a retired Judicial Officer (Magistrate and Coroner) and Barrister who has a keen interest in history, especially ancient classical history. Michael presently holds the positions of: Deputy President, Friends of Antiquity, University of Queensland; Convenor, Science and Philosophy Interest Group, The Queensland Club; and Convenor of History and Public Interest Group, Tattersalls Club. Former positions held include that of Vice President, Royal Historical Society of Queensland and President, Cook Society of Queensland. Michael is an active member of St Thomas Aquinas Church St Lucia, and Coordinator of Catholic Religious Instruction at Ironside State School.

Secretary: Patrick O'Neill. Patrick came to Australia in 1994 to study archives management. He worked at the National Library, Parliamentary Library and Australian National Audit Office, before moving to Brisbane in 2021 and becoming Joint Archdiocesan Archivist in 2022.

Treasurer: Luke Preston. Luke is a Brisbane solicitor specialising in construction law, and has been a member of the BCHS Committee since 2021. To complement his post-graduate qualifications in law, Luke is presently completing a Bachelor of Arts in the Classics. With a particular interest in ecclesiastical and mediaeval history, Luke has spoken internationally on the parallels between the design and erection of Europe's Gothic cathedrals and problems encountered in modern construction law. Locally, he is currently finalising a paper on construction and design elements of the three St Mary's Churches in Ipswich.

Committee Members

Ignatius (Ian) Bonaccorso. Ian holds a Master of Education (Hons) from UNE Armidale NSW. He is the author of two published books significant to Queensland history. He is a long-term member of RHSQ and in 2021 was awarded the Centenary Medal by the Society for his contribution on the Queensland Italian diaspora. Ian has been an ongoing member of the BCHS Committee for the past seven years.

John Browning. A retired educationalist, John has an MA in Modern History from Oxford University. He is the author of *Always Mindful – A History of Catholic Education in Central Queensland 1863-1990* and *Welcome Learning – A brief history of Goodna's Catholic School*, as well as many articles and some books on railway history. He is a member of the Governing Council of Good Samaritan Education, a Ministerial Public Juridic Person.

Dr Neville Buch. Neville is an expert on histories and historiography of big belief and doubt. He has been a Q ANZAC Fellow at the State Library of Queensland (2015-2016), and a speechwriter and higher education researcher, working with four Vice-Chancellors. He is well-published and recognised for his contribution in the histories of both Catholic secondary and state primary education in Queensland, as well as histories in the cultural and religious shaping of Protestant and Catholic organisations.

Judith Gardiner. Judith has had a career in non-government and government education as a teacher and curriculum professional, working for many years in Queensland Catholic Education Commission before taking up a senior role with the Queensland Studies Authority. From 2008 she served as the Executive Officer and company secretary for Mercy Partners, prior to taking a position in the Rockhampton Diocesan Office. She currently serves as a non-Executive Director on two college boards. Judith holds a Master of Theology (UNE), and a Master of Educational Studies (QUT), Judith is a Graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors (GAICD) She joined the Committee of BCHS in April 2023.
